

Anti-Bullying Policy

RATIONAL

A clear and agreed working definition of bully that I used in this policy is:

Bullying is both behaviour and impact; the impact is on a person's capacity to feel in control of themselves. This is what we term as their sense of 'agency'. Bullying takes place in the context of relationships; it is behaviour that can make people feel hurt, threatened, frightened and left out. This behaviour happens face to face or online. (Respectme2015)

Bullying behaviour can include:

- Being called names, teased, put down or threatened face to face and/or online
- Being hit, tripped, pushed or kicked
- Having belongings taken or damaged
- Being ignored, left out or having rumours spread about you (face to face and/or online)
- Sending abusive messages, pictured or images on social media, online gaming platforms or phones
- Behaviour which makes people feel like they are not in control of themselves or their lives (face to face and/or online)
- Being targeted because of who you are or who you are perceived to be (face to face and/or online)
- Prejudiced-based bullying based on an individual's actual or perceived identity; it can be based on characteristics unique to a child or young person's identity or circumstance

Within St. Patrick's Primary School, we are committed to creating a positive ethos and culture of dignity, excellent behaviour, strong leadership, shared responsibility, inclusion and equality, partnership working and a sense of community. We adhere to national and local guidance and procedures.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND EXPECTATIONS

Staff within St. Patrick's:

- Promote an ethos and culture of praise and positive behaviour
- Encourage children and young people to develop the necessary skills such as self-awareness and self-esteem, and develop coping strategies, assertiveness and resilience
- Should listen, learn, involve and resolve
- Should be aware of the reporting and recording systems in place to respond to incidents of bullying behaviour
- Should support the person(s) experiencing bullying behaviour and person(s) displaying bullying behaviour as the aim is to change behaviours positively
- Liaise with parents and carers where appropriate and without breaking any confidentiality

Parents/Carers:

- Report any bullying incidents to the school, but they should address their children's behaviour when it affects others negatively
- Monitor their children and young person's use of electronic devices, mobile technologies and social media, including setting parental controls
- In the first instance, report any abuse to website providers, make sure their children unfriend or block abusers
- Be aware that there may be incidents which they may have to be reported to the police

Young People:

- Continue to develop self awareness and resilience and know where to seek help
- Contribute to creating a positive, friendly, welcoming ethos and develop strong relationships with peers
- Report any incidents of concern to staff
- Be aware of the impact of your words/actions on others and seek ways to include all
- Celebrate differences rather than targeting those who are different
- Use social media in a safe and responsible way with appropriate privacy settings
- Report any online abuse to a trusted adult and/or the website providers, unfriend or block abusers if necessary

POSITIVE STRATEGIES AND STRUCTURES

All staff, parents, carers, children and young people, the wider community and partnership colleagues

- Role model positive relationships and positive behaviour and, create a culture of praise within our school
- Ensure that children and young people develop the necessary skill, such as self-awareness, selfesteem, avoidance and coping strategies, assertiveness and resilience, through CfE capacities of successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens and in particular, the Health and Wellbeing and Technologies outcomes.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN IF BULLYING IS SUSPECTED

If bullying is suspected we will talk to the suspected victim, the suspected bully and any witnesses. If any degree of bullying is identified the following action will be taken:

Help and support from a member of staff will be given, as appropriate, to both the young person and the bullies.

We support the young person in the following ways:

By offering them an immediate opportunity to talk about the experience with their class teacher or another teacher if they choose.

By informing the young person's parents/carers.

By offering continuing support when they feel they need it.

We will try to help the bullies in the following ways:

By talking about what happened to discover why they became involved.

By informing the young person's parents/carers.

By continuing to work with the young person – to help rid them of prejudiced attitudes.

All incidents will be recorded in accordance with SLC procedures
